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





THE HARDEST LOGICAL PUZZLE

world-renowned Coined by logician Raymond Smullyan, the following problem has been described as the 'world's hardest logical puzzle'. Logicians were stumped by its complexity until it was solved in 1996 by American mathematician and George Boolos. At first glance, it seems outright unsolvable, yet, hidden somewhere within the layers of its intricate wording is an answer to one of the most perplexing, yet elegant puzzles devised. Ladies and gentlemen, it's time to take a trip to an alien planet ruled over by three Gods, and find out what they have in store for us.

The standard statement of the problems is as follows:

Three gods - A, B, and C - are called, in some order, True, False and Random. True always speaks the truth, False always lies, and whether Random speaks the truth or not is a completely random matter like the toss of a coin. Your job is to determine the identities of each God by asking three yes or no questions. Each question can be posed to exactly one God but the same God can be asked multiple questions. The Gods all understand English, but will answer in their own language, in which the words for yes and no are 'da' and 'ja'. You do not know which word means which.

Read that? Give it a try. Have at it for a few hours. Once you've eventually given up, come back, and let's go over the solution to this mind-bending puzzle.

There are two things that really complicate this problem. The first one is Random - the fact that you never know if he's lying or telling the truth. Baiting out the identities True and False seems straightforward. but the addition Random adds a whole new level of difficulty. The second hurdle is the fact that you do not know what the words 'da' and 'ja' mean. However, there's a rather clever circumvent way to both of limitations.

Firstly, the words. The key to negating the words' meaning lies in a kind of question called a hypothetical. For a moment, assume that Random was out of the equation, and you were speaking to only True or False. If you asked them some statement, say "Is New Delhi the capital of India?", they would reply with their words for either 'yes' or 'no'. This tells you neither the meaning of the words nor the identities of the gods, effectively wasting a question. However, this is where the hypothetical comes into play. A hypothetical embeds a question into another question, creating a situation where we can gain information from the answers, even though we don't know what the words actually mean. Let's look at an example.

Suppose you were to ask True "If I asked you whether Russia is the largest country on Earth, would you say ja?" (Assume that you do not know this fact). Let's look at the possible answers in the form of a matrix –



Russia is the biggest country Russia is not the biggest country

'Ja' means 'yes'

'Ja' means 'no'

True answers 'ja'. Effectively, what he's saying is 'Yes, I would say yes'

False also answers 'ja'. His original reponse would be 'da' - a lie - but he also lies for the second question. The double negative creates a positive and we get a 'ja'

True answers 'ja', effectively saying 'No, I would not say 'no' In similar fashion, the double negative causes False to answer 'ja'. His original answer would be 'ia', but he flips to 'da' and says 'No, I would not say no.

Here. True answers 'da' saying "No, I would not say yes". Keep in mind the original question.

False's original answer would be 'ja', but the second lie flips it to 'da' and he answers 'da' effectively saying "No, I would not say yes"

True's answer here would be 'da', as he's basically saying "Yes. I would say no" Again, the double negative causes False to flip from 'da' to 'ia', and he answers 'da' basically saying "Yes, I would say no"

If I asked you whether Russia is the biggest country on Earth, would you say 'ja'?

From the matrix, we make our first interesting observation - if Russia is indeed the biggest country on Earth, we get 'ja', regardless of the God we're speaking to or the meaning of the word. Similarly, if Russia is not the biggest country, we get 'da'.

The embedded question in the hypothetical gives us four possibilities - double positive, double negative, or two versions of one negative-one positive. It is the combination of these properties that allows us to discern whether or not Russia is indeed the largest country on Earth without knowing the meaning of the words 'da' and 'ja'.

Do a few more questions and you'll begin to see a pattern - if the answer to the embedded question is affirmative, the answer you'd get from either of the Gods is the word in the question, and vice versa.

Now, what about the second problem? Figuring out the identity of Random is almost impossible, and would be a gross waste of questions. The catch here is, instead of trying to figure out which God is Random, we try to identify which one isn't. Let's see how this will play out.

A small note before we dive into the actual solution of the main problem - matrices outlining the possibilities and outcomes of each question aren't given, but I highly recommend you draw them yourselves. They are the easiest way of understanding the logic behind these questions and to see all the various possibilities at play.

First, you go to the God in the middle and ask him, "If I asked you whether the God to your left is Random, would you say 'ja'? There are two possible answers to this question, and both give us substantial information. Draw your own matrix to see how the various answers play out, because it's really important to understand how this question works in order to grasp the full solution.

If the god tells us 'ja', then we have two possibilities. First, the god we are speaking to is True or False, in which case the god on the left is Random, or second, we're speaking to Random himself. Either way, you know for sure that the god on the right isn't Random. Similarly, if you get 'da', its the same two possibilities occur, so you know for sure that the god on the left isn't Random.

Once you've gotten through this task, go to the god who you know for sure isn't Random. Now, it's just a matter of determining whether the god is True or False. Ask the god "If I asked you whether you are True, would you say 'ja'? Here's the matrix for that question, because it's a little different from before -

	God is True	God is False
'Ja' means yes	Here, you'd get a 'ja'. True is effectively saying "Yes, I would say yes"	False's original answer to this would be 'ja', because he lies. However, the double negative causes him to flip and say 'da', effectively "No, I would not say yes"
'Ja' means no	Here too, True replies 'ja', basically saying "No, I would not say no"	Here, False's original answer would be 'ja'. However, he flips and says 'da', effectively saying "Yes, I would say no"

If I asked you whether you are True, would you say 'ja'?

Again, we see something interesting. If the god is True, we get a 'ja', and if the god is False, we get a 'da'. This is because in the previous examples, the embedded question had a fixed answer - whether you were talking to True or False, it did not affect whether Random was the god in the middle (assuming you were not talking to Random).

However, God you're talking to, and this is what disconnected, causes the gods to give different answers. The third question is whether the God in the middle is Random, 'ja'? would you say 'ja'?" We still have to stick to question remains the same regardless of say 'ja'? whether the god you're talking to is True or False. Following the pattern, you get a 'ja' if 3. Alright, let's make a promise to bring genuine concern to all of our encounters and comprehensions henceforth.


I agree, You. Let's start on the journey of strengthening our relationship, where kindness and compassion are woven throughout the fabric, enhancing "me" and "you."


This balanced approach to personal and professional life aligns seamlessly with the values espoused in the great epic.

Being one of the finest teachers at CIRS, with an abundance of experience we would like to ask, what initiated your passion towards the field of education?

"My family has a legacy of teachers. My aunts were teachers, my cousins were teachers, my own brother is the principal of the PSG public school, my cousin is the principal of the Bhartiya Vidhya Bhavan and so I can proudly say that it runs in the blood."

You have mentioned several times that your first love is Mathematics. What is it that made you fall in love with Mathematics?

"When I say mathematics is my first love, you should know who is my first God. My first God was not Ganesha or Shiva or Krishna. It was Mr. Ramesh, my brother's mathematics professor. I was not fortunate enough to sit in his classroom in college, but I have had opportunities where I would just walk with him to class. I used to ask him what I thought to be a very complex problem. He wouldn't think twice and answer immediately. Another aspect of him was his sheer passion for mathematics. He worked in a government arts college. Amongst his colleagues who were always unpunctual, Mr Ramesh was always on time. In his bag, he would always carry a box with all mathematics instruments necessary. That is what made me fall in love with mathematics. It was Professor Ramesh, and second, was well... my own brother who shared my interest towards math and became a math teacher. Mr. Ramesh was the one who asked me to take Physics. I was inspired by what he said, and I had faith in his words."

Being a Physics teacher, how do you teach a variety of subjects ranging from, Chemistry, Accountancy, Math and even Hindi?

"I started my journey as a teacher when I was in class 11. When I was in my first year of college, I started coaching centers and we used to coach for Math, Physics, Chemistry and Hindi. We also had an Accountancy teacher. One fine day this teacher decided to leave, so, someone had to chip in. Then I decided that it's better not to depend on somebody else. I had a marvelous book on accountancy, Shukla Vimal. This is a book on double-entry bookkeeping. I read this book and I was just fascinated. In a month, accountancy was effortless, right from entries to final accounts. Moreover, I am a Hindi Pracharak who was instructing students and helping them in their examinations. Chemistry is a natural inclination being a science teacher. Many times this was a necessity. When my students asked me a question, I could never say, 'I don't know', and to avoid being blank, I had to learn. I would say that my students are my teachers. Their need became the necessity for me to learn."

Carl Sagan said "Physics is philosophy written in the words of Mathematics." Physics is often related to philosophy yet physicists are known to be atheists. What are your views on this?

"Physics is not written in mathematics, Physics is mathematics. Upon learning higher levels of Physics, one understands that they are the same. And when you look at Physics from the angle of its impact on human life, then yes, it definitely is a philosophy. I never mix Physics with my religion, the very fact is that it is foolish to mix both. Definitely, their ways may be different, but they are equally helpful to mankind."

Most students always get confused while picking their stream after grade 10 and choosing the right college after grade 12. What is your suggestion to all such students?

"Being confused is absolutely fine at this age. Act in accordance to what your heart says. Don't take it up because somebody else is taking it up as each one is different. Follow your heart, find what you love and stick to it."

At any point in the class, no matter how serious it is, you effortlessly transition it into a lighthearted mood. Do you think it is needed while teaching?

"It's absolutely important to bring in humour in the class, otherwise you will lose connectivity with your students. It is like establishing a link and unless it is not in place, you cannot communicate. So if you don't connect with your students, you cannot teach them. Teaching is not important, ultimately learning is important. For effective teaching, there must be a connection which may waver and as teachers, we should re-establish it. Humor is a wonderful way of achieving this."

Taking a step back from classes, let's talk about your interests outside the classroom, especially on the tennis court. Could you give us an insight into these things?

"When I was your age, I wouldn't study half as much as all of you do. I would attend classes, come back home and play, play and play! If it's raining, I'd play carrom, if not, then cricket. Studying wasn't particularly challenging; I would write and remember all of it. This was only possible because my mind was fresh, and it was so because of sports. The school in which I taught earlier, I wasn't a teacher, I was more like a student. I learned a lot of physics, basketball, hockey, and tennis. I also learned about technology. I would pester the Head of IT Department with the question, 'How to make a powerpoint presentation?' I only wanted to teach in a boarding school; I only wanted a boarding school to play. That's why I came here."

That's great to hear sir! Then what is it that started your inclination towards Bharatiya Classical Music?

"This is a very good question you have asked. I have never learned any music, only by listening, however, I am learning veena right now. As I mentioned, I didn't have a lot of difficulty in learning and it is so because of classical music. I fervently believe in that because I used to listen to music and I would study. I have never studied without music, and I always believe that if there is a soothing song, then that's the only distraction albeit music. There are always 100 distractions and thus, you are able to do better with 1 distraction, which is a distraction you love."

Sir, you always had a penchant for teaching regardless of whatever other work you have. How do you manage to balance administration and teaching on a daily basis?

"It is very stressful, and it takes me away from the joy of teaching. I don't want to lose that joy and I always say, 'I can fail as an administrator, but I cannot fail as a teacher.' This position of being a teacher is a fulfilling position and thus, I don't want to lose it. Furthermore post-retirement, I wish to teach physics to students who are truly passionate about the subject."


THOUGHTFUL TALES

Being righteous is the guiding principle of life. A righteous person can stand alone against the world, for right is right, even if one person upholds it, and wrong is wrong, even if a thousand individuals endorse it. Real education is akin to a spiritual journey, with ego serving as the greatest obstacle and humility as the greatest ally. The more we learn and grow, the humbler we should become. Consider trees: as they grow, they contribute more to the ecological system. Rivers, too, offer more to life as they grow. Yet, we, as humans, often think small – the more we grow, the more we accumulate solely for our families, without contributing to our nation or society.

When we proclaim, "Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam" – the world is one family, it becomes our responsibility to contribute to this global community. Let us begin by demonstrating responsibility within our own school.
