Model C20 Press Corps

Civil20 (C20) is an engagement group of the G20 that represents the civil society organizations of G20 member committees. It acts as an independent program that promotes policy dialogue between G20 and civil society governments organizations. The C20 typically holds its summit and related events before the G20 leaders' summit, providing CSOs with an opportunity to discuss and enhance policy recommendations socio-economic on matters.



The C20 group operates on principles of transparency, collaboration, independence, and sustainable development. To further discussion on the theme of India's G20 presidency, Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam, various CIRS student committees held debates on the 25th and 26th of April 2023, under the Model C20 Banner. The Dharma committee consisted of 40 student delegates representing the G20 nations. The session included opening speeches, a question-answer time, moderated caucuses, and the preparation of resolutions. Loyalties shifted and alliances changed as blocs brainstormed resolutions. The day concluded with the final resolution being chosen, amended, and passed.

All students took part with sincere effort and interest in enhancing the world through the theme of Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam. The Model C20 School Seminar was a conclusive and grand success, with students representing their respective countries and understanding others' viewpoints. All discussions were successfully carried out with proper decorum and conduct.

Another such committee was the living oneness committee, living oneness is the idea that all living beings and things are interconnected and interdependent, emphasizing that we are part of one collective consciousness.

The committee discussed how countries have implemented or will implement policies to strengthen this idea. Caucus discussions covered issues such as cultural integration, women's empowerment, and de-dollarization. Delegates of Saudi Arabia and the Republic of Korea discussed their countries' efforts to reduce discrimination and encourage cultural exchange, respectively. All countries collaborated to establish common goals and address shared concerns, including education for all and military regiment exchange.

The committee on Earth Revering Traditions focused on indigenous practices to revive the land and foster reverence for Mother Earth. Delegates from India proposed a cultural exchange for adopting traditional practices, based on Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam. Formal debates led to two resolutions, including global initiatives for youth awareness, minority inclusion, and government efforts to revive indigenous practices. The delegates proposed innovative policies for future implementation after extensive research and deliberation. Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam implies that all living beings and the ecosystem are a family. Discussions on the impact and inclusivity of indigenous practices built the foundation for the committee. The resolutions offer hope for implementation in the coming years.



CIRS students had also constituted two other such committees discussing a wide range of topics related to Ecology, Regenerative Development, Business and Economy.

In summary, the C20 provides a platform for CSOs to discuss and address global concerns, and it operates on principles of transparency, collaboration, independence, and sustainable development. The Living Oneness committee discussed policies to strengthen the idea that all living beings and things are interconnected and interdependent. The Dharma committee held debates on subtopics related to Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam, and all committees successfully prepared resolutions. The C20 School Seminar was a grand success, with students representing various countries and understanding others' viewpoints.
